

- Romani minority
- Vietnamese minority
- Slovak minority
- Polish minority
- Ukrainian minority





The Romani Minority

- 2,2% of the Czech population (262 000)
- They came to our territory at the end of the 14th century
- About 57% in age of 20-60 of Romani minority doesn't work
- About 30% people of this minority is unlettered and 4% of them has done high school
- This minority is one of the most problematic ones in the Czech republic

The Vietnamese Minority

- Max. 1% of the Czech population (60 000- 100 000)
- They came to our territory in the middle of the 20th century
- Vietnamese own thousands of small convenience stores with lower prices, a lot of goods and long opening hours
- Some of them are here illegal
- Vietnamese criminal groups controlled most of the production of meth and marijuana in the Czech Republic

The Slovak Minority



- 1,5% of Czech population (193 200)
- They didn't come to our territory, but some of them stood here after Czechoslovakia fell apart (1993)
- That's the reason why they speak very similar language as we do
- They look the same as we do and don't have any characteristics

The Polish Minority

- 1,2% of Czech population
- After Slovak minority they are the second biggest minority in the Czech republic
- Most of these people live in Silesia (about 80%)
- There are some schools in Silesia for polish children

Ewa Farna, a singer Alojzy Martynek, a head of a folklor group











The Ukrainian Minority

About 1,4% of Czech population (152 699)

They are the 4th biggest minority in Czech republic

Their numbers in our territory started to grow in the 90s because of work.

They were working on construction sites for example.

About a third of them lives in Prague.











Foreigners living in the Czech Republic - by country
