Joy Adamson (whole name Friederike Victoria Gessner) was born on January 20, 1910 in Troppau, Silesia, Austria-Hungary (now **Opava**, Czech Republic).

When she was 12 she moved to Vienna to her grandmother, she studied music, sculpting, art and photography, in 1937 she relocated to Kenya.

In Kenia she married George Adamson (1944), a British who had worked in Kenya as a gold prospector, goat trader, and safari hunter. For 15 years she painted

flowers for botanical books, spending time camped out in the wild; became interested in African customs, ornaments, and costumes, which she began painting as well. She adopted

three lion cubs; kept Elsa, the smallest, and wrote book Born Free, followed by Living Free and Forever Free, which told of experiences living with the lion and returning her to the wild.

She proved that captive wild animals could be reeducated to live in their natural habitat, a practice widely used today.

At age 69 she was **murdered** by a dissatisfied employee on January 3, 1980 in Shaba National Reserve, Kenya.
